Bushfires swept across Victoria in February 2009. Homes were destroyed and thousands of books turned to ash. The ALIA Disaster Recovery project was set up and Yarra Plenty Regional Library led the initiative, distributing an emergency stock of second-hand books to families left homeless by the blaze.

Many libraries asked what they could contribute. Then, there was little anyone outside the affected area could do. Now, there is the chance to be part of a nationwide library campaign Rebuilding with Books, providing new books for families with empty bookshelves.

Between 24 and 31 October, 2009, we are asking libraries to hold a booksale or some other fundraising activity to raise money for bushfire affected communities.

Our target is to provide every household with a voucher to purchase one new book for their home.



2009 outcomes

Collaborative action – partners brought together by ALIA

\$110,000-worth of new and pristine second-hand books distributed in bushfire affected communities

\$9510-worth of vouchers given to families who lost their homes in the bushfires

ALIA submission to the Royal Commission Bushfire Inquiry

A further \$2310-worth of vouchers to bushfire-affected families from the sale of pallets of donated books to second-hand booksellers

Cheques for \$2000 to each of the three rebuilt schools to spend on books for the library
