Introduction

On 6 July 2017, in Geelong, Victoria, 12 library leaders participated in a conversation about how a united library field can tackle the challenges of the future. Together we represent 360 years of library experience.

The Australian Public Library Alliance is part of the Australian Library and Information Association and represents 94% of all public libraries across Australia. The meeting was the annual strategy and planning event, and it took place at the award-winning new Geelong Library and Heritage Centre.

A vision for libraries

Libraries enable literate, informed and participative societies. When we look at the future, according to the debates in Geelong, this means that libraries lead in literacy; librarianship is a sought after profession; libraries are valued by the community and benefit from government and philanthropic investment.


The core values of libraries (Q4):

- 5. Innovation




Libraries are exceptionally good at (Q5):

- 5. Quantifying/evaluating/statistics




Libraries should do more of (Q6):

- 4. Long term strategic planning

Libraries should do less of (Q7):


- Taking on more without dropping things off over extending ourselves

Challenges and solutions


The main challenges to society (Q8):

- 2. Access to accurate information
- 3. Growing inequality (polarisation of poor and rich)
- 4. Environmental sustainability
- 5. Technological disruption; privacy and Big Brother in a digital environment



The main challenges to libraries (Q9):


- 1. Relevance in the face of Amazon, the Internet
- 2. Reducing and uncertain funding
- 3. Succession planning and staff steeped in the past
- 4. People reading more/less time for reading and reading differently
- 5. Breaking down stereotypes



How a united library field can make a difference

How should a united library field help meet the challenges identified (Q11)?

- 1. Global view is the antidote to division
- 2. Strong shared vision and voice
- 3. Build on the role of public libraries as a place for critical thinking; promoting truth talking
- 4. Supporting developing countries
- 5. Influence and representation at the table



The characteristics of a united library field (Q12):

- 1. Shared vision, united voice
- 2. Understanding, appreciation and acceptance of common ground and differences
- 3. Collaboration around core values and to promote equity of access to information
- 4. Compelling narrative and data for libraries' contributions to the Sustainable Development Goals
- 5. Clear action plan, roles and responsibilities

A global conversation

This report is created in an interactive process, in Geelong, Victoria on 6 July, 2017. It is part of a global conversation initiated by IFLA on how a united library field can tackle the challenges of the future.

Over the course of two years (2017-2018), IFLA will involve as many librarians and others as possible in this global conversation. At the end of 2017, the first results of all the workshops and online discussions will be turned into a *Global Vision Report*, which in turn will be adapted into concrete strategies, processes and work programmes in 2018.
